

29.1.78. White Woman's Hole.

After several visits Ray & myself discovered we were looking on the wrong side of Asham Wood ravine for the cave. Stay on the same side of the stream as Tom Tivey's Hole and with your back towards Tom Tivey's Walk along rough track at the top of ravine for about $\frac{1}{4}$ mile the cave is in a small cliff with a Yew tree just in front of it.

26.2.78 Nancy Camel's Hole.

Ray & myself found this cave with ease, situated in small cliff just N. of Shepton Mallet Sewage Works, and approx one field E of small bunting lane which leads to Ham Farm in small wood, there appears to be farm effluent flowing into the cave from fields above.

4.3.78 Went a walk to look at the re-opened dig in Binney Bottom. Good progress has been made and a sizeable passage leads off.

19.3.78 Gower Peninsula, South Wales,

The weather today lived up to British standards by being cold & wet with a strong wind blowing off the sea (Force 8) Ray & myself started at Port Eynon Point Cave and then made our way west along the beach and cliff path to Culver Hole most interesting entrance which is partly walled up, onto Long Hole and Pavilion cave but we did not reach it as the tide by this time was high we returned to the car at this point.

12th March 1978. Site marked on map visited by Kay and Ray Mansfield, Martin Mills and Simon Davies at the request of Tony Harris of Priddy Hill Farm. Shaft top dug open and cleaned up and descended to a depth of 25ft by Simon. Water in bottom found to be 10-12ft deep. From the pipework and steel beams in the shaft it is thought that this is an old well which has long since been abandoned.








ROCKET DROP (Cheddar Cross Roads, Compton Martin)

Dear Ray,

Greetings from the far (frozen) North with this interruption to your annual typing marathon.

Apart from the couple of enclosures the principle purpose is that following our visit at Xmas I encountered other persons (notably Mike Palmer) with views on the Cuthbert's insurance question and thought you might be interested to know of these. Incidentally Pete Hiscock passing thro' last w/e confirmed that leaders have become very rare birds - tho' he says Batch is thinking of taking up the leadership/insurance challenge (again), and our latest leader Phil Dunk apparently is not prepared to take out the required insurance. Mike Wheaden has taken the same line as us that they can stuff their leadership.

Mike Palmer has also taken a similar line, but was planning to write a mammoth epistle setting out his views in a forceful ~~writer~~ manner, but has since decided that silence is probably more effective. He understands that only about 6 leaders have forwarded insurance policies for ratification - including OCH, Graham Price & Tony Meadow - the latter apparently with a couple of others have also sent in very strongly worded letters

of protest. Mike also agrees that he doesn't see how the matter can go any further, since it was agreed at the last Leader's meeting that the question would be looked into and reported upon at the next Leader's meeting and Martin Grass' (Caving Sec.) letter of 30th November seems to be jumping the gun.

Monday 4th Oct. Visited Alternative Cave and Victorian Cave at Settle.




Wednesday 3rd. Mother Shipton's Cave and Dropping well, Knaresborough.

Thursday 4th. Visit to Aughtborough Cave and then onto the Alltarmont in the rain to look at Silver Pot, Rift Pot, Jockey Hole, Long Mim and Juniper Gully.

Sunday 7th. Walked up to Rendale Caves Entrance then across the moor to Langdale Pot.

Wednesday 10th. Grangehead Holes in the rain. Then down Parry Ghent to Harton.

Friday 12th. Up to Turton Road and then drove through Knaresdale looking at Wild Head, Valley Entrance and Yards Caves. PM to Shipton Museum.



Sunday 18th November 1979. This Batstone called at 4.30 pm to say that there had been an accident in Thorpe lane Scarlet. Down cave by 5pm but straight out again to organize digging out the coal at the bottom of Perseverance Pit. Down again to Atlas pit & out to surface to organize tackle, medical supplies and hot soup. Back to Atlas and helped ring the girders a haul out. Continued to shingle clinkers - down to surface with mangles fit by about 2am. Home, with a bed by 3a.m. Details in newspaper cuttings below:-

From "Gemsbok", Kuruman 5-11th OCTOBER 1979

A couple, Francis and Anne Thackeray (both studying for doctorate in Philosophy at Yale University, USA) are at present digging at "Wonderwerk" caves on the farm "Wonderwerk", owned by Gerrit Nienwoudt. The caves are reckoned to be older than half a million years.

The Thackerays are investigating especially the upper deposits — from late Stone age. The deeper layers to be reclaimed by archeologist from McGregor Museum in Kimberley, Mr. Peter Beaumont.

During the last $\frac{2}{3}$, they have unearthed cave paintings, ostrich egg beads, pendants grindstones, and bits of bone (probably remains of food of the last inhabitants of the cave).

Drawings are of animals and unknown figures. The diggings may contribute to information regarding climatic changes. There appear to be indications that there were both wetter and drier periods than now experienced.

Thackerays to stay another month, then hope to move on in search of similar caves in Kuruman — Danielskuil — Postmasburg — Sishen areas. They are appealing to farm owners who have unprobed caves or shelters on their property to contact them. (The reporter adds that it is illegal to dig or remove anything from any caves without a permit, obtainable from: National Monument Board, c/o McGregor Museum, P.O. Box 316, KIMBERLEY 8300)
